When the Saturday Evening Post published Burnett's story months later, Butts and Bryant successfully sued the magazine for libel. The purpose of this study was to describe the reclassification process of Western Kentucky University's football program from the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS), the highest and most visible level of NCAA competition. Three research questions guided the study: (a) Why did Western Kentucky University reclassify the football program from the Football Championship Subdivision to the Football Bowl Subdivision, (b) How did the National Collegiate Athletic Association procedures on reclassification impact the transition to FBS football, and (c) What are the expected effects of the reclassification on Western Kentucky University and its



stakeholders? This qualitative case study was an in-depth look at one institution's organizational change during an NCAA reclassification. This case study gathered evidence through document mining, interviews and observation during the two-year football reclassification at Western Kentucky University. Credibility, transferability, dependability and confirmability addressed the quality of this research. The findings were presented in a descriptive narrative around emergent themes. Regarding rationale the following themes emerged; (1) NCAA affiliation is important to the overall mission and reputation of Western Kentucky University, (2) Athletic programs are an undeniable part of WKU history and modern culture and their importance and impact cannot be ignored, (3) There were multiple athletic administrative reasons for the reclassification, and (4) The football reclassification is one aspect of an overall transition taking place at WKU. Regarding process the themes showed; (5) The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the Sun Belt Conference supported WKU's transition to FBS football, (6) The decision to reclassify required careful planning and research, and (7) Administrative leadership played a key role in the reclassification process. Effects expected were; (8) The elevation of the football program will enhance the quality of all other sports and (9) A division I football program can improve WKU's profile and the community of Bowling Green, Kentucky. This examination of athletic change provided insight on the value of intercollegiate athletics and provided useful information for other institutions considering an athletic reclassification. Furthermore, this study identified considerations for future research in athletic and higher education administration. Abstract: Few sociological studies have addressed the association between deviance in Division I athletic departments and the problems of public

impression management faced by the individuals who comprise these athletic departments and, subsequently, the universities with which they are affiliated. To examine the processes of public impression management and the management of deviance in sport, I conducted a content analysis of newspaper articles concerning the recent events involving Maurice Clarett and The Ohio State University. This study seeks to explain how Maurice Clarett's reputation as a deviant became solidified and how OSU successfully managed deviance through media coverage of the controversy. Additionally, I attempt to illustrate how the Clarett story supports the Durkheimian perspective of how deviance can be functional. Using Lexis-Nexis Academic database, I obtained data on 3693 articles published between January 2003 and September 2005 in U.S. newspapers. A quantitative analysis of the full dataset was conducted in order to examine the breadth of coverage and patterns of coverage across time and space. This portion of the analysis was followed by a qualitative analysis of a sample of 100 articles published in opinion leader newspapers, which provide insight into the specific frames and counter-frames put forth by the various actors and reputational entrepreneurs involved in the controversy. In line with the principles of combative frame analysis and reputational analysis, media framing of the Clarett story led to the construction and solidification of Maurice Clarett's deviant reputation. This was due to Clarett's lack of strategy in communicating with the media as well as the success of more experienced and powerful reputational entrepreneurs in framing Clarett as a deviant. Findings also indicate that Ohio State successfully managed deviance through effectively framing and counter-framing the events of the story. Additionally, the Clarett controversy supports Durkheim's theory of deviance, exemplifying the functions of Clarett's deviance for the university, the NCAA, the

An initial survey size of 96 (out of 103) players was gathered, and the weekly reaction surveys have averaged 25 to 35 players. When compared with the weather variables gathered for each

game, the surveys indicate that there are geographic (within the United States) regional implications how weather affects the game of football and the perceptions of the players.
